Calendar Description

GBLD520 Navigating Geo-Political Dynamics of Global Communities

Develops understanding of global communities in their relationships to wider social, cultural, historical, political and economic settings, factors, and ideas. Students connect theories and practices in global community development to the shifting social, political, and economic environments that shape people's lives in the global North and South. Participants explore the centrality of the concept of globalization and the integration of local and global forces. They develop and apply global literacy in a number of domains: political, economic, cultural, moral, organizational, and spiritual/religious.

Credits

GBLD 520 is worth 3 credits. Each course credit represents about 33 hours of effort by a student.

Course Overview

The purpose of GBLD 520 is to develop an understanding of the meaning and impact of the term 'globalization' from the perspective of local communities and institutions, as well as from the viewpoint of global institutions. The structure, contents, readings and exercises presented in this course are designed so as to comprehend global issues and connect theories and practices in global community development, to the shifting social, political, and economic environments that shape people's lives in the global North and South. Through interaction with fellow students that bring different experiences of life from communities in different countries and case studies from across the world, students will be able to explore and analyze the centrality of the concept of globalization and the integration of local and global forces.

Further, the course will help the student perceive the intrinsic linkages between political, social and economic processes at global (macro), national (meso) and local (micro) levels. How do the events in one community impact on another community geographically and socio-politically distant from the previous. The readings, assignments and interactions with fellow students and instructors will facilitate making connections across forces of globalization and their impacts on different levels of communities.
